Dear Wellspring Families,

As our 2021-2022 school year has gotten off to an enthusiastic start, I would like to truly thank our Wellspring teachers, staff and leadership who came to work during their summer vacations to prepare for the challenging year ahead. Although, a few parents did voice their preference to begin in October, Wellspring wanted to take full advantage of these first few weeks in September to support our students mentally and physically as they make enormous social and academic changes in their daily lives. The school's decision to begin with face to face classes on September 2nd was clearly within the guidelines of the Ministry of Education. Wellspring has a "Plan B" for days when it will be necessary to stay home and return to the use of virtual learning. Obviously, fuel and electricity continue to remain problematic whether students are at home online or at school. Thankfully, our fuel supplies continue to be adequate enough at both campuses to run AC's, lights and the school's internet. If fuel becomes totally unavailable in the country then all of us will have problems whether learning from home or school. The coming weeks will be challenging yet we must move forward with learning.

COVID Measures

Our Wellspring nurses continue to have strict Corona guidelines and protocol for students, teachers and staff who display symptoms of illness during the school day. As for morning arrivals and dismissals, anyone who enters the campus does have their temperatures checked. Anyone whose temperature is above 37.5 will not be allowed to enter campus. The nurse will immediately be notified to take further action and to record all details for further follow up. Bus-riding students will not be allowed to enter the bus before a temperature check. If a child displays a temperature above 37.5, he or she will be asked to return home. It is imperative that the person who is responsible for the child, remains with the child until the child is given an "ok" to board the bus. Grade 12 Lebanese Official Exams

First of all, Wellspring is extremely proud to have all of our Grade 12 Lebanese Baccalaureate students pass their official government exams with two earning Bien! Congratulations to their teachers and students for their amazing dedication! Another 100% pass rate for Wellspring!

IB Full Diploma Results

Although this year's IB students in Lebanon were granted an exemption from taking the physical exams, students were not automatically awarded the Full Diploma! Students were awarded the Full Diploma according to their International Assessments (IAs) and IB external moderation. Congratulations to our students who earned the Full Diploma with grades ranging from 26-42. Besides 100% of our Full IBDP students earning the Diploma, Wellspring had one student who earned IB's Bilingual Diploma. Remember how our students complained bitterly at first, about the unfairness of taking the exams, but became very confident and serious at the end? Hard work from year to year does pay off! We are proud of all.

Grade 9 Official Exams

As the official Brevet exams were cancelled by the MEHE, all Brevet students were promoted contingent on them passing their MYP subjects. A special mention to the Brevet teachers who continued to provide support and extra-classes to our students until hours before the cancellation was announced.

Grade 10 IB Personal Project Results

Wellspring is equally proud of our outstanding Grade 10 Personal Project results. In total, 43 of our students completed projects with the Wellspring school average of 4.88 which is almost 1 full grade above IB schools' world-wide average of 3.90.
